Mayor Annise Parker

In 2023, our community garnered national headlines because of relentless attacks on our freedoms and equality. The Supreme Court ruled in favor of discrimination under the guise of religious freedom, more than 500 pieces of anti-LGBTQ legislation were introduced, and politicians used trans kids as political punching bags. But what the headlines also emphasized – and what we know well at LGBTQ+ Victory Fund – is that our community is mobilized and fighting back.

A historic number of LGBTQ+ candidates ran for public office – surpassing all previous odd-year election cycles. Victory Fund endorsed a record number of candidates (almost 260), made strategic investments, expanded candidate services, and put more boots on the ground than ever before.

It was an incredible year for Victory Fund endorsed candidates. Seventy-one percent won on Election Day. They won in places that are in desperate need of LGBTQ+ leadership. Due to the Magnolia Initiative – our plan to expand LGBTQ+ political power across the South – LGBTQ+ leaders are proudly serving in new or higher elected positions in Mississippi, Tennessee, Texas, and Virginia. Trans and non-binary candidates won school board and state legislative seats in places that have proven to be the epicenter of the policy and legislative debates on our lives.

These victories will continue to resonate, and we know those elected will be our firewall against legislation that attempts to invade our bedrooms and medical decisions and erode our dignity. And those who bravely stepped up to run – regardless of the outcome of their campaigns – have inspired even more to run for office and ensure LGBTQ+ people are present and visible on the trail.

The onslaught against our fundamental rights continues. But the future of equality rests in the hands of those who are willing to fight those who aim to undermine it. Thanks to your support and commitment, we were ready to win in 2023, and we will continue to push forward in 2024.

Electing LGBTQ+ Leaders

Beating Bigots

During odd-year election cycles, down-ballot races have a chance to shine. State legislatures, city councils, school boards and other local seats are all up for grabs. These are the races where LGBTQ+ Victory Fund makes an outsize impact – changing the dynamics and propelling candidates to victory. We racked up more than 500 hours of direct candidate support. Victory Fund staff was on the ground with campaigns throughout the year, including Spotlight candidate Fabian Nelson in Mississippi – who won and became the state's first out LGBTQ+ state legislator.

Victory Fund also had a significant impact on campaign coffers, leveraging the bundling power of the Victory Campaign Board to directly invest more than \$946,000 in LGBTQ+ candidates in 2023.

In part because of Victory Fund support, more than 70 percent of our candidates won on Election Night – a historic high for an odd-year election cycle.

Key Victories

One of the core aspects of LGBTQ+ Victory Fund's mission is to ensure America's LGBTQ+ candidates have the resources, support, and knowledge to win their elections. By elevating our candidates' stories and campaigns, we are winning more elections than ever – and changing the face of American political power.

In 2023, LGBTQ+ candidates ran to win – and we fueled their victories.

On the Ground


We were on the ground providing direct support for 51 candidates in 10 states. LGBTQ+ Victory Fund staff boosted candidates in key states such as Ohio, Pennsylvania, Texas, and Virginia.

Black Leaders Caucus

In 2022, a group of LGBTQ+ Victory Fund supporters formed the Black Leaders Caucus to address the severe underrepresentation of America's Black LGBTQ+ community in government. The Caucus identifies, recruits, and supports Victory Fund's Black LGBTQ+ candidates around the country. In 2023, the Black Leaders Caucus hosted key events around the U.S., campaigned with candidates, and contributed more than \$30,000 directly to Black endorsed candidates!



Spotlight on School Boards

During the COVID-19 pandemic, school boards became ground zero for anti-LGBTQ and anti-diversity legislation. But LGBTQ+ people are stepping up to ensure kids will read LGBTQ+ inclusive books, protect LGBTQ+ kids in schools and create safe learning environments. Together with national partners, Victory Fund prioritized school board races in 2023. Over 140 LGBTQ+ people are now serving on school boards across the U.S. and more LGBTQ+ school board candidates won in 2023 than in 2022!

LGBTQ+ Candidates Changing History



Danica Roem

Victory Fund was critical to Danica Roem's history-making House of Delegates race in 2017 – and we were all-in to help her shatter another lavender ceiling in 2023. We worked closely with her campaign and supported counterattacks at her transphobic opponent, helping her become the first out trans Virginia State senator and just the second out trans person ever elected to a state senate in the U.S.



Fabian Nelson

Victory Fund invested a record amount in Fabian's campaign, giving our time, training, resources, and on-the-ground support. During his first campaign, Fabian received only 33 votes. He attended an LGBTQ+ Victory Institute Candidate & Campaign Training, and Victory Fund staff embedded in his campaign. In 2023, he won 69 percent of the vote, shattering a rainbow ceiling in Mississippi, and becoming the first out LGBTQ+ person elected to the state legislature.



Luanne Peterpaul

Former County Prosecutor Luanne Peterpaul previously served as chair of the board for Garden State Equality, working to defend challenges to New Jersey's state law prohibiting conversion therapy and helping pass marriage equality. When school districts started banning books in her district, Victory Fund knew we had to get involved early to help make sure Luanne won. Thanks to Victory Fund's on-the-ground support, Luanne is now the first out LGBTQ+woman elected to the state assembly!



Andrea Jenkins

One of our most vulnerable incumbents – and the only Black out trans woman currently serving on a city council in the U.S. – needed our full support. Through on-the-ground campaigning and financial backing, both the Black Leaders Caucus and Victory Campaign Board ensured Andrea's victory – by only 38 votes!



Rue Landau

Hard to believe, but true: the City of Brotherly Love and Sisterly Affection had never enjoyed LGBTQ+ representation on the city council. A longtime LGBTQ+ activist and political leader, Rue Landau changed all that with the help of Victory Fund, becoming the first out LGBTQ+ person elected to the Philadelphia City Council. Philly is the U.S.'s 6th largest city and is the last top-25 city in the country to elect an LGBTQ+ city councilmember!



Olivia Hill

Over the last several years, Tennessee has become known for its "slate of hate" legislation – bills crammed together to form a mass of anti-LGBTQ legislation. But Victory Institute Candidate & Campaign Training alum Olivia Hill was ready to run anyway, winning election to the Metropolitan Council of Nashville and Davidson County and becoming the first out trans person elected in Tennessee!



Amelia McMillan

As part of our School Board Initiative, we went all-in for Amelia McMillan, running for the Central York School Board in the swing state of Pennsylvania. They beat a conservative slate to earn this essential seat and ensure that the students, not anti-LGBTQ rhetoric, are the focus. Amelia is now one of just 15 out gender non-conforming people serving in any position in the entire U.S.







Victory in Texas

Additionally, Spotlight candidate and 2023 candidate for Houston City Council Mario Castillo pulled off a tough win in the runoff after campaigning with Victory Fund President & CEO Mayor Annise Parker!


